1. Allen R., Delaware's Panel 50 delegate, who served on Panels 50 and 51 (2000 and 2001), passed away several months ago. Let's please observe a moment of silence for his sobriety, 12th Step work and his AA service. He was a tall man who had a good personality and a great sense of humor. He, along with others, including Doug T., Panel 44 delegate and the longest tenured Delaware delegate alive, created the Area 12 Service Manual, that you now can find online in its updated form.

She also opened the Workshop on Friday evening, sharing her experience, strength and hope in recovery and to being a "special worker" for the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. Thank you, Kelly.

FRIDAY EVENING MEET AND GREET SESSION

On Friday evening, we held our annual "Meet and Greet" session. This time is devoted to turning the floor over to workshop attendees who share what they do in their Bridging the Gap programs. They may have Treatment, BTG, Prerelease, Contact on Release or combined Treatment and Corrections and Bridging the Gap programs. Those programs may be part of their Area's or District's structure, part of their local Intergroup/Central Office structure, or part of an H&I structure. This session is always lively and lasts well into the night.

PRESENTATIONS

There were 5 Panel presentations on Saturday. They included "How to Build a Committee by James from Area 26, How to Train volunteers by Marlene from Area 10, BTG Networking in your Area by Heather from area 62, BTG in Hospitals by Angela from Area 40 and Bridging the Gap Online by Danielle from Area 72

Kelly C, GSO Staff, gave a presentation on GSO and how the Treatment Desk works with Bridging the Gap. Saturday Evening Kelly was our Banquet Speaker sharing her personal experience, strength and hope.

BUSINESS MEETING

On even years the Workshop has its elections for Coordinator and Alternate Coordinator for the next two years. The new Coordinator is Rob O. from Denver Colorado. Rob served as the Alternate Coordinator during the previous rotation.

Our new Alternate Coordinator is Amanda S. from Lachine, Quebec Canada. This is the first time the Workshop has had a Canadian Officer.

SITE BIDS AND BUSINESS

We had 2 bids for future Workshops. Area 5 (Los Angeles County, California) for 2025 and Area 78 (Alberta, Canada) for 2026.

There was much discussion about the rising costs of hotels for meeting rooms and sleeping rooms.

Area 5 presented a preliminary proposal to hold 2025 in Los Angeles. There were lots of questions from the membership that had not been included in the proposal by the hotel. The Area 5 bid team was confident they could work out the details with the hotel for a financially viable contract.

Area 78 presented a preliminary proposal for 2026. The hotel prices (after conversion to American dollars) seemed more than what the workshop could afford, primarily the requirement for a \$4000 Canadian (~\$2900 American) deposit. Area 78 was going to work more on their bid and resubmit in 2025.

During the business meeting that followed the bid presentation, discussion was held concerning increasing the amount of registration to cover the increased costs of the upcoming years. Cheri gave a detailed list of typical expense items was given to the members along with projections for 2025 and 2026 including the increased costs for meeting spaces. A motion was made to increase the registration costs for the weekend up to \$75 (American) if needed. The motion was seconded and passed. A minority opinion was given that it was too big an increase for one year. The minority opinion did not change any votes. A request was made to consider a one-day pass at a lower fee be included in the registration and that was agreed to.

A new item for discussion was brought up to also make the 2025 weekend hybrid. There was much discussion about the details of how to make 2025 a hybrid event. At 4:40PM the allotted time for the business meeting had already been exceeded and further discussion was postponed until later that evening after the banquet.

TECHNOLOGY PRESENTATION

Gavin O, from Area 6, gave a presentation on how their area uses AirTable to coordinate their contact list and the facilities they are taking meetings into. For more information on using AirTable you can email Gavin at goconotron@gmail.com

Cheri J of Area 39, who serves a non-rotating position on the BTGWW committee, reviewed BTGWW's website and gave out the user and password for 2025. She discussed her plans for 2025. NEW FOR 2025

As requested the BTGWW steering committee, working with the Host committee, has arranged for virtual attendance at the 2025 workshop.

Also available this year will be a day pass (for Saturday) for a reduced rate. Banquets may be added to the day pass with registration.

After much discussion the workshop attendees also approved raising the registration up to \$75 if need be to cover costs in 2025. Because so many people ordered the banquet last year we were comped the meeting rooms. This allowed last year's expenses to be less than estimated and gave a financial cushion for the steering committee to feel safe with only raising the registration to \$60 (\$50 if you register early) and testing how day passes and virtual attendance will the workshop's goal of being self-supporting each year.

A full report and recommendations for future workshops will be given at the business meeting when in-person registration and hotel block fulfillment numbers are available.
